Connecticut Transportation Updates

Transit Forum on December 10th

The December 10th "Transportation Funding in Connecticut: Where We Are and What is Next" opens with featured speaker Governor Malloy followed by Keynote Speaker Jack Basso, Director of Finance and Management, American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials. The panelists include Emil Frankel, Bipartisan Policy Center; Oz Griebel, MetroHartford Alliance; Joe McGee, The Business Council of Fairfield County Commissioner; James Redeker, ConnDOT and Moderator: Stewart Hudson, Emily Hall Tremain Foundation. Mobility Management Website

Taxi Voucher Program

The Kennedy Center, Metro Taxi and Greater Bridgeport Transit have initiated a Regional Mobility Management Project Taxi Voucher Program, funded under the FTA's 5317 New Freedom Program in conjunction with Connecticut DOT. Greater New Haven Transit District in partnership with Metro Taxi and Connecticut DOT began a Taxi Voucher Program in May of 2011. Each month ADA eligible riders can purchase up to \$50.00 of taxi transportation and GNHTD will match those funds for a total of \$100.00 utilizing New Freedom Funds. The rider is given a debit card which is easily filled for subsequent purchases. Since the inception the program has grown steadily to about 50 rides per month. At least half of the rides are taken by a rider with a wheel chair.

Hartford Bus Circulation

CROCOG and the City of Hartford are holding a public meeting on Monday, December 10 from 5:30-7:30 pm to present their findings of a "study of downtown bus circulation and proposals for improvements. CACT Updates

Workshop A Success

The workshop “Mobility Management & New Freedoms: Optimizing Your Funds” was held on Thursday, November 29th at the Greater Hartford Transit District Meeting Room before a packed audience. Moderator and CACT Chairman Jonathan Rubell introduced the panelists: Lisa Rivers, CONNDOT; Alan Naudus, GNHTD; John Roode III, ECTC; and Margaret Mixon, The Kennedy Center. Lisa noted the town of Enfield will have public transportation, funded with a New Freedoms grant, and as noted in previous CACT newsletters, Waterbury now has evening bus service. The new MAP-21 has combined the 5310 and New Freedoms programs which are administered by CONNDOT. John Roode noted that by utilizing the New Freedoms Grants, ECTC was able to hire a Mobility Information Specialist, produce the “Getting

Around Eastern CT Guide”, tailored their website to be a one point access for info on transit options in southeastern CT; and provide subsidized taxi service for seniors and people with disabilities 24 hours a day. Margaret Mixon is looking into new services, working on a Guide Book and project website along with a Regional Vehicle Inventory utilizing 5310 funding. The Kennedy Center has worked with Metro Taxi and Greater Bridgeport Transit to offer the Taxi Voucher Program in their region. Alan Naudus noted how successful the New Haven Taxi Voucher Program has been particularly since customers don’t have to plan in advance.

During the question and answer period Lisa Rivers noted that CONNDOT has 2 new programs relating to mobility management in south central CT funded is: a study to look at what they want to do about mobility management and how best to implement the recommendations. In north central CT, the North Central Region Mental Health Board will be providing mobility management and purchasing touch screen kiosks for trip planning.

What's In Your Wall?

This cross section of our galvanized steel roll cage makes a bus "a bus". These steel sidewalls extend beneath the floor and when welded and bolted in place, provide added strength and safety in the event of an accident. It may seem strange, but we spend considerable time thinking about safety, because although your passengers take it for granted, we can't. That's why we build it in from the ground up, then test it—specifically the FMVSS 214 side impact test.

At a proving facility in Wisconsin, a 4,000 lb. steel sled approaching 35 m.p.h. slammed into the side of our bus. The concussion was mind blowing—the damage to the bus was minimal. In fact, we drove the bus back home! Steel cage design is unique to our buses and as noted above, it's not pretty, just pretty effective.

Here are just a few more features:

- Low center of gravity that reduces rollover potential.
- Floor frame of 11 gauge steel Z members.
- Laminated walls for structural integrity.
